I have to assume they were homeless. My head has never been in the sand when it comes to noticing the suffering of too many of our brothers and sisters.

DON'T BECOME A CRIME STATISTIC

On September 26th our council hosted a security presentation by Police Officer Luigi Galano of the 111th Precinct's Crime Prevention Unit. The presentation was very informative and well received by all in attendance. Officer Galano advised us of several reported incidents affecting our immediate area and suggested ways to minimize our exposure. Following are some highlights of his presentation for those of you who couldn't attend:

Identity Theft: It's the fastest growing crime and can create financial hardships for those affected. Minimize your exposure by not carrying documents with your social security number on it, i.e. Social Security card, Medicare card (carry only when you have a scheduled doctor's appointment), etc.

Health Club Thefts: The second fastest growing crime in our community. For all our jocks, don't leave valuables in the clothing lockers. Use security lockers that are monitored by staff.

Auto Larcenies: Don't leave valuables in plain sight. Not only won't they be there upon your return, you'll probably have to pay to have your broken window repaired. During this upcoming holiday shopping season, park in well lit areas and don't store purchased gifts in your car while you continue shopping. Someone may be watching.

Burglaries: Some good news, they're on the decline in our area. The best deterrent is a functioning security camera followed closely by a barking dog. Keep in mind dogs need to be walked on cold winter nights.

Pick Pocketing: Reports have risen in high density shopping areas. Be aware of your surroundings and safeguard your valuables.

One of the recurring themes throughout the presentation was the need to report any suspicious activities through the 911 system. Your suspicions may prove to be unfounded, but let the responding officers make that decision.



The meeting ended with a discussion on how to deal with disruptions at large gatherings. This was very topical with the recent events in Kenya and Roosevelt Field. Closer to home, our large gatherings include Bingo on Tuesday evenings, all our Masses and various other Church sponsored events.

There isn't a single right, or wrong, response to emergency situations. People react differently when confronted with such incidents. Opportunities arise, and vanish, as an incident evolves. Responses can range from doing nothing to defending yourself or others. Once again, it helps to be aware of your surroundings. Assess the situation and develop an exit strategy. Keep in mind that the way you came in may not be the best way out. If safely evacuating an area is not an immediate option, concealment may be appropriate. Call for emergency assistance (911) as soon as an opportunity arises. Don't depend on someone else making the call for you.

Thanks to the efforts of the New York City Police Department, we live in one of the safest communities, in one of the safest large cities, in this country. Let's help them help us by heeding some of their advice, and taking reasonable precautions while going about our daily routines. Hopefully our biggest problem will be calming an excited bingo player.

A special thank you goes out to Steven Caruso who came through with the top selling raffle. The brand new soccer, football and basketball prize went over huge with all the kids and their parents.


All in all it was a huge success and we are so excited for next year's Kickoff Celebration at Morton's in Great Neck. Just kidding fellas....
