## THE FOOD COLLECTION PROGRAM AT AMERICAN MARTYRS CHURCH

One of the first and most important building blocks of the American Martyrs Food Collection Program was put into place when Steve and Valerie Day moved to our Parish 27 years ago from Saint Matthias Parish in Ridgewood. Soon after joining our Church, and having both been active members of the Saint Vincent dePaul Society, they proposed to Monsignor Keppler the idea of opening a Saint Vincent dePaul pantry at American Martyrs. Father Keppler agreed and allotted the closet space in the Religious Education Center (now known as the Murray Center), where the pantry is still located. The pantry relied on special food collections at Mass at Thanksgiving and Easter along with weekly donations of bags of food left by parishioners at weekend Masses. It should be noted that this weekly tradition predated Steve and Valerie joining our Parish. At its peak, the pantry assisted 16 families in our community. Many people have given their time to the pantry over the last quarter century – too many to list here, but without their help there would not be a pantry today.



More recently, about 5 years ago, while at Stop and Shop in Glendale, I saw a local member of the Knights of Columbus collecting food by himself at the door. Although I didn't speak to him, his dedication planted the idea in my head that perhaps our Council could do the same – thank you brother Knight – I wish I could shake your hand. All it took was a phone call to the store manager and a request letter and we were on our way. We started the first year with one collection which was a success. Soon afterward, Marie DeAngelis, who had become the latest in a dedicated line of Pantry Coordinators, had forged a relationship with Our Lady of Lourdes Outreach pantry, which serves over 200 families. The following years saw the American Martyrs Knights of Columbus increase our collection events to five per year. The food and cash donations collected are divided between the 2 pantries by Marie DeAngelis, who attends each collection event. Food is also collected at Mass once a year and parishioners still leave bags of food at weekend Masses each week.



Of course none of the work we started could be accomplished without the help of my Brother Knights who give up their time to help others. Just as important is the “shot in the arm” we have gotten in the last year from members of the Columbiettes, who have partnered with us to increase our numbers and thus made us a stronger team. Last, I have to thank the children. They come down on their day off from school with a smile on their faces and sing and make up food collecting chants which touch shoppers to donate – you guys are great! Of course, thank you Father Frank for establishing our Council and the Columbiettes. Thanks for leading us on a brighter path, with the many different things we do to help others.

## Treasurer's Report on our Council's Donations

The finances of our Council have been managed since the inception of the John J. Murray Council by Carl Reyes, our efficient and capable treasurer. With his careful management of our funds and the hard work of our brothers our fundraising activities enabled us to provide support to many organizations in need of help.

Carl recently reported on the numerous donations and contributions we have made in the last few years and outlined the following efforts:

Our donations and other charitable outlays last year (2016) totaled over \$16,000.

- \$5,000 to Generations of Faith Fund
- \$1,500 toward Seminarian support
- \$1,000 to American Martyrs Columbiettes in their Habitat for Humanity fund drive
- \$1,000 to American Martyrs Annual Appeal

In the coming year, we will continue to support activities that have noteworthy causes and which are in need of our financial help. This serves as the cornerstone of our Council.

Our council will continue this work and with the commitment and efforts of our brothers will continue to carry on the mission that founder Venerable Father McGivney set out for us when he established the Knights in 1882.

## Insurance Agent's Message
